

Mr Gum

For example: "I 'aven't done nothin' wrong!"

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Who Said What?

When using speech, you normally add a reporting clause to let the reader know who is speaking. This can come before or after the speech. For example:

Reporting Clause Rachel said, "My favourite food is pizza."
"My favourite food is pizza," said Rachel. Reporting Clause
